

Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railroad Slideshow Presentation


This month John Garfield will present a slide presentation on his experiences from his recent trip to ride the this narrow gauge scenic railway.





NMRA, Division 1 Minutes, October 8, 2018

Mike Mackey, President, opened the meeting shortly after 10:00 AM due to heavy rain with a thank you to Discount Model Trains for their support. He then called on Darrel Cowles, President of Texas Western Model Railroad Club, host, who noted that membership to the club is open.

Treasurer Report: Ken Kaiser, Treasurer, noted that the current balance is \$6000+

Plano Train Show, Oct. 29th/30th is in need of volunteers from the club to man the NMRA booth. The Division earns two shares, which were \$2300 last year, for the two shows by the North Texas Council of Model RR Clubs, and hopes to do like-wise this year. Chris Atkins, Chairman, earns many of the needed hours, but help is needed at the NMRA table. It is also noted that Donna Orr, Division 3, is organizing the 2019 LSR Conference and is looking for volunteers to help with that show. This show is the first one to operate on a reduced agenda to try to promote greater participation. It was noted that volunteer hours for all sponsored events earn time toward an AP Certificate

Mike noted that Dr. Mike Ross has volunteered as Membership Chairman. Dr. Ross provided an up-date to the O Scale Convention. Mike noted that the Division needed to buy a screen projector. Ken Kaiser noted a price of \$440 including extra cord. The machine is self contained and does not need a laptop to operate from tabs. Purchase was approved.

Mike noted the loss of Charles Lynn, Jr., 45, son of President Chuck Lynn, from cancer. Donations were accepted and matched by the Division to the American Cancer Society in his name.

Donuts and coffee are provided by the Division, donations to the fund are appreciated. Mike noted that there are numerous model items for sale including the shelves used for display. 10% of the proceeds will go to the Division. Ken Kaiser noted the car registration competition set up in back, winner to be announced at the end of the meeting. Ken also noted that a Rails Mountaineer is being organized for September 2019 if anyone is interested. Discount is available until Oct. 12, 2018. See Ken for details.

Show and Tell was held with three participants.

Mike noted that he is working to organize an NMRA International Conference in Dallas/Fort Worth for 2023. He noted that he has contacted the NMRA Conference Chairman but has much already organized including possible trip for rail and non-rail participants, transportation, hotel and food. He noted that he has contacted both the Gaylord to host the conference and hold the traditional train show, and, Spencer Christian, well known national model railroad speaker and TV personality (Tracks Ahead), has agreed to waive his normal speaker fee for payment of transportation, food and lodging. Mike noted that he has over 35 layouts lined up for visitation and/or operation with OpSig. He noted that he has spoken to a transportation provider for discounted bus service with a list of sites in both Dallas and Fort Worth, and would like to feature AT&T stadium for a dinner and has spoken to Rod Stewart's production manager (Rod is a well known modeler) to put on a show there. Competition is with South Michigan but NMRA feels good about this proposal. Plans are for this to be a Texas themed conference. One has not been held in Texas since Houston many years ago and is being well received. He is negotiating a possible 80/20 local/national split of the proceeds. A petition was handed out and acquired 41 names from Division 1. Donna Orr of Division 3 will do the same next Saturday to show support. A petition of only 25 names is necessary to make a proposal.

Following this, the raffle was held with gift certificates by Discount Model Trains of \$25, \$15 and \$10.

From Duane Richardson Division 3, MMR

f Y ou have heard me make a pitch to get involved in the Achievement Program(AP) and you have probably heard me say that it will make you a better modeler. This is a very true statement. Just ask any MMR and they will confirm this. It goes beyond that. I was fortunate enough today to give a friend of mine, Jeff Palmer, his MMR plague. When asked to say a few words he mentioned several other pieces that are also benefits to the program. It's the friends and the support system you build along the way. The friendships that we make in the hobby are just as important as the hobby itself. It's those friends that you can rely on to look at your work and give you an honest opinion. They know they don't have to say something nice for fear of hurting your feelings. This is how we learn. It's how we get better. So, to paraphrase, it takes a village to raise a Master Model Railroader. None of us got here on our own and each of us has signed a promise to help anybody who wants to follow us on your journey.

When you first look at the AP it seems like a really daunting task. I've talked with guys who have said that they don't have enough time left in their life to get it all done. Do you have 9 months? That is the shortest time I've known of a modeler starting from



nothing and achieving his MMR. For most of us it takes years. However, it's all time well spent. Each step along the way to building a layout are all things that can count towards the AP. I know of some that think that it only counts towards new work. This is not true. It doesn't matter how old the work is as long as it's good enough to merit. So, if you have a layout at home or a club then you can have it judged.

I know the word judge scares some people. Nobody likes it when someone makes a comment about how we raise our kids. Well, these models are like our babies some times and it's hard to put it on a table and have someone look it over with a critical eye. Larry Swigert likes to say that it's an evaluation instead of a judging. I like the sentiment there.

This isn't as harsh a deal as you might fear. A judges job is to look for flaws but it's also to instruct. We should give you feedback of what can be done better and how if you want. The other nice thing is that you can have a model judged more than once. If you get it scored, and you aren't happy with that number, you can fix the model and have it judge again... and again...

The only downside to the AP is all the paperwork and boy is there paperwork. When you look at the forms page on the website you will see 2 types of forms. There is a "Record and Validation" set and a "Statement of Qualification (SOQ)" set. Let me save you some work. Don't worry about the Record and Validation. It's not needed when you submit your paperwork. It's just a checklist for you. All you need to submit is the SOQ plus any score sheets and other documentation needed(which varies from one category to another). If you have any questions on anything involved in with the AP or modeling in general, please feel free to reach out to me. My contact information can be found on the LSR website on the officers page or in the Marker Lamp under Achievement Program Chair.

Lastly, if you have made it this far, and I hope you have, you might be asking yourself, "Where do I begin?" That's a really good question and the answer is that it depends. If you have a layout now then we need to evaluate the work you have and I can help you develop a game plan on how to achieve your goals. If you are starting from scratch I would like to suggest starting with Prototype Modeler. Even if you are not a Prototype guy it is a good place to start. Models can be part of more than one category. So, if you pick the right project you can cover a lot of ground.

Take my nephew for example. When I talked with him about this, he liked the idea and after some research he picked Rico, CO. which was a division point on the Rio Grande Southern. It had a yard which featured turnouts, a crossover and a 3 way stub switch and there was enough trackage there for him to lay the 40 feet he needed for HO. So there's Prototype Modeler, Civil and Electrical. Civil and Electrical are usually done together because so many of the required drawings overlap. If he makes it big enough he could get his 32





square feet of scenery. There were a couple of mines, the depot, the engine house, the water tank, the coal pocket and several other structures. Is it enough to get Structures? Maybe if you build enough 'town' buildings to get all 12 you need. He could build a few car kits and scratch-build a few for the scene which would give him Cars. If he writes articles for the Marker Lamp, or this news letter, or for some of the magazines you can get points towards Author. Build a website for it and you can get half your Author points there. So, to recap, Prototype Modeler, Civil, Electrical, Scenery, Structures, Cars and Author. That's all 7 and 1 from each of the 4 categories. One project and you can be an MMR.

I know it really looks like a huge challenge but it really is a fun journey. Please feel free to reach out to me any time with any questions. I'm here to help you.
