
Jim will be doing a program using PowerPoint® titled "Adventures Beyond the Wood Pile; An overview of the pulp and paper industry in East Texas, Arkansas, and Louisiana."

This will be an overview of how pulpwood was used, how the railroads historically handled the commodity, and how one can model pulpwood and paper mill operations. Early cars were homemade and rarely strayed from home rails. By the 1950s, operations became more structured. Independent loggers could order a rack car, contract with a broker to sell it to a paper company, and it would be transported to a paper mill.



Finished products shipped would include different grades and weights of paper, cardboard, or packing materials. Some mills would use wood chips and a paper mill would receive tank cars of all sorts of chemicals. Often, a chemical plant was located next door and there were all sorts of ancillary businesses next to a paper mill.

Since Jim models western Arkansas and East Texas, the talk will be skewed somewhat towards MoPac/TP, Frisco, and SP/Cotton Belt, but those interested in other regions can get ideas on adding these operations.





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It is hard to believe but the event we have been planning for the last 2 years is finally here--- 2023TexasExpress, the NMRA International convention.

I know many of you have registered and are looking forward to attending and are well aware of all the advantages of being at a NMRA National Convention. I want to address this column to those who may be undecided at this time and point out several major advantages of attending.

• Where else would you be able to learn new techniques and approaches to enhance your modeling skills in a short period of time? Currently there are more than 250 hours of clinics put on by almost 100 clinicians. All the clinics are designed to increase your skill and knowledge of model railroading and are taught by experts.

They say: "seeing is believing". Wouldn't it be nice to see some of the best layouts in the area? I have not seen a layout yet where I haven't learned a new trick or two.

• At 2023TexasExpress there are 16 layouts and 2 live steam layouts on the bus tours as well as 23 layouts on the Self-Guided Open House tour. This is a fantastic opportunity to see those layouts and learn from others.

Texas Railroad Prototypes for the Average Modeling Space

This is the first in a series of articles on the small reailroads of Texas. Part of my purpose here is to demonstrate some railroads that would serve as average-sized home layout prototypes. I may stray a bit from Texas but not too far as there are plenty of prototypes past and present out there within the state.



If you have ever been to the Galveston Railroad Museum in, you guessed it Galveston, you have most likely seen the Baldwin 2-6-0 behind the museum building. This locomotive is the only extant piece of equipment of the Waco, Beaumont, Trinity, and Sabine Railway (WBTS). The locomotive was purchased by the Moody Foundation and snatched off the rails in Trinity, Texas just ahead of the scrappers. The WBTS emerged from the bankruptcy reorganization of an earlier railroad in April of 1923. The railroad headquarters were in Trinity and the track ran roughly eastwest for 48 miles. A year later the railroad purchased a section of railroad from the MKT. Its 66 miles resulted in a total of 114 miles arranged roughly in a V shape with the point at Trinity. One leg ran east to Livingston and the other leg to Corrigan northeast of Trinity.

What makes this an ideal prototype for a home layout, many of which are loop shaped, is the Southern Pacific predecessor Texas and New Orleans closed the open end of the V interchanging with the WBTS at both ends in Livingston and Corrigan. The WBTS also interchanged with the MoPac/IGN in Trinity.

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
The railroad had ICC approved plans to extend its rails to Waco and Beaumont but never could garner the cash to do so. The Great Depression, over cutting of the timber along the route, and low revenues led to bankruptcy in February 1930. The WBTS never emerged from bankruptcy proceedings and ceased operating in 1961. Incidentally this was the longest railroad bankruptcy in Texas railroad history.

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Modeling the rolling stock for the WBTS won't break the bank as the road only owned 58 cars and six locomotives in the mid-1920s. The rolling stock would be a mixture of old wooden cars, flatcars and boxcars, purchased second hand. The locomotives were small oil burners, and would be well weathered and decrepit. No ballasting needed, much of the right of way was weed covered with dirt to the tops of the ties.. Despite the lack of preserved prototype equipment, the interested modeler has as a great resource, the website of Jason Rose at https://www.wbtsrailway.net/history.htm. This site has a wealth of prototype photos of equipment, maps and railroad structures. Jason and his crew have done a remarkable job preserving this historical record.

The graphic below is a rough idea of the railroad arrangement and clearly demonstrates the possibility of a home layout configured in a loop fashion for prototypical operation (point-to-point) and continuous running.
